 - 1) Moses Request to be Allowed to <u>Enter</u> into the Promised Land of Duet. 3:23-26 of Mt. 17:1-3
 - 2) The Prayer of Abram cf Gen. 15:2-4
 - A Deferred Affirmative Answer Does Not Means God Is <u>Ignoring</u> Us or Our <u>Plight</u> When He Delays Answering our Prayers cf Ex. 2:23 – 25; 3:7-10
 - a) The Phrase: And it came to pass in the process of time / Now it came about in the course of those many days (N.A.S.B.); Literally Reads in the Hebrew: 'During those many days' = the Time After Moses Had Fled from Egypt to Midian cf Ex. 2:11-15; 4:19; Acts 7:23-34 Which Covered a Period of 40 Years cf Acts 7:23, 40 cf Ex. 7:7
 - b) The Word 'Sighed' / 'Groaned' (T)\$); English Transliteration anach = Conveys the Thought of Expressing Sounds of **Grief** and **Pain** of Psalm 31:10; Jer. 45:3; Ezk. 21:11

- C) 'They Cried' (אָשֵׁקְ) English Transliteration zaaq = To Cry Out for <u>Help</u>, Implore Someone to <u>Help</u> and Is Used for Prayers That Call Upon God for <u>Help</u> cf 1 Chr. 5:20; 2 Chr. 18:31; 20:9; 32:20; Neh. 9:14, 28; Psalm 22:5; Psalm 107:13, 19; 142:1, 5; Lam. 3:8; Hosea 8:2; Jonah 1:5; Micah 3:4 There Are Some Instances Where בין English Transliteration zaaq Is Used Without an Object and Denotes a Sense of Utter <u>Despair</u>, <u>Hopelessness</u> Because of the Circumstances cf 2 Sam. 13:19; 19:4
- d) God Heard שֵׁשְׁ English Transliteration (shamah): to Hear and <u>Respond</u> to cf Gen. 16:11; Ex. 3:7; 6:5; Psalm 31:7; Psalm 145:19
- e) God Remembered TI English Transliteration (zakar): This Does Not Mean to Suddenly Recollect or Recall Something Which Had Been Forgotten; It Denotes God Is Taking Action to Bring About That Which He Has Promised of Lev. 26:40-45; Psalm 105:8-45; 106:43-48
- f) 'God Looked Upon / Saw' TST English Transliteration (ra'ah): Literally Means to See with One's Eyes; Also Used Figuratively with the Sense: 'to take into account, consider the troubles of others' cf Gen. 31:42; Ex. 4:31; Psalm 10:11
- g) 'God Knew' בְּדֶב English Transliteration (yadah) The Hebrew Word Has Several Senses: in This Context = to Take <u>Notice</u> with the Implication That God Would <u>Take Care</u> of the Cause of the Israelites Grief, Pain, Despair Which Left Them in a State of Hopelessness
- h) Exodus 3:7-10 God Is Speaking *Directly:* The First Person '1' Is Used *Six* Times in Verse 7-10
 - 'I have surely seen' 3:7
 - 'I have heard' 3:7
 - 'I know' 3:7
 - 'I am come down' 3:8
 - 'I have seen' 3:9
 - 'I will send' 3:10
 - The Six-Fold Repetition of the First Person, Pronoun 'I' Indicates God's <u>Intense</u> Personal <u>Interest</u> and Active <u>Involvement</u> in the Plight of His People
- i) The Words 'My People' Verses 7 and 10 at the Start an End of God's Direct Words Highlight the <u>Personal Relationship</u> God Has with the People

- j) Ex. 3:7 Places Added Emphasis to God's *Genuine Concern* for the Affliction of His People
- 4) Possible <u>Reasons</u> Why God Might Delay in Answering Our Prayers
 - a) To Teach Us to <u>Trust</u> Him cf Prv. 3:5
 - b) To Develop Maturing <u>Faith</u> cf Mt. 15:21-28; Lk. 18:1-8
 - c) Delayed Answer Brings Greater **Glory** to God cf Jn. 11:1-45
 - d) So That We Might Maintain a <u>Proper Perspective</u> of <u>Humility</u>; and Remember God Is Not Our Servant But He Is The Lord God Holy, Almighty, Who Reigns and Rules over All cf Isa. 6:3; 66:2; Dan. 9:3; Lk. 18:9-14; 1 Tim. 6:15-16; Rev. 4:8; 19:6

Theological and Practical Impact

- 1. Though a Prayer May Not Be Answered Immediately <u>Continue</u> <u>Praying</u> in Hope of an Answer That Might Be Given at a Later Time
- 2. Remember Though God Might Answer Your Prayer Immediately He Is <u>Not</u> Ignoring You and Is <u>Aware</u> of and <u>Concerned</u> for You
- 3. An Answer <u>Delayed</u> Is Not an Answer <u>Denied</u>
- 4. If God Delays in Answering a Prayer, Know and Believe It Is in Your <u>Best Interest</u> and for Your Ultimate Spiritual Well-Being
- 5. Because I <u>Know</u> God It Is Not Necessary for Me to Know <u>Why</u> God Has Me Waiting for an Answer to a Prayer
- 6. God's Timing in Answering a Prayer, Will Never Be <u>Early</u> nor <u>Late</u> It Will Always Be <u>Perfect</u>
