Spots and blemishes are they, taking intense delight in their deception while feasting with you." 2 Pet. 2:13

e. Some of The <u>Results</u> of Hedonism for False Teachers and their Followers

- Hedonism Is among the Many Tools <u>Satan</u> Uses to <u>Divert</u>
 Unbelievers Away from God and to <u>Draw</u> Believers from
 Walking with and Glorifying the Lord and into his Alluring
 World System Which Holds Out the False Promise That
 Fulfilling Hedonistic Desires Will Bring Happiness and
 Derails Believers from Glorifying God cf James 4:4-7
 - a) James 4:5 Is a <u>Difficult</u> Verse and Can Be Translated Three Ways and Possibly Understood as Many as <u>Nine</u> <u>Different</u> Ways
 - The Spirit Could Be Interpreted as Being the <u>Human</u>
 Spirit or the <u>Holy</u> Spirit
 - ii. The <u>Subject</u> Could Be Interpreted as Being God or The Human Spirit, or The Holy Spirit

- iii. The Verse Could Be Interpreted as Being only a <u>Question</u> or as Being a Question Followed by a <u>Declarative</u> Statement or as Being <u>Two</u> Questions
- iv. The Scripture That Does Not Speak in Vain Is Open to at Least <u>Three</u> Different Explanations

"Do you think the Scripture speaketh in vain, The spirit that dwelleth in us lusteth to envy?" James 4:5 (KJV) (the spirit is the human spirit and it is the subject)

"Or do you think that the Scripture speaks to no purpose: "He jealously desires the Spirit which He has made to dwell in us?" James 4:5 (NASB) (the spirit is Holy Spirit and God is the subject)

"Or do you suppose it is to no purpose that the Scripture says, "He yearns jealously over the spirit that he has made to dwell in us? James 4:5 (ESV) (the spirit is the human spirit, and the subject is God)

"Or do you think Scripture says without reason that he jealously longs for the spirit he has caused to dwell in us?" James 4:5 (NIV -2011) (-1984 version is different) the spirit is the human spirit and the subject is God

"Or do you suppose that it is for nothing that the scripture says, God yearns jealously for the spirit that he has made to dwell in us?" James 4:5 (NRSV) (the spirit is the human spirit and God is the subject)

"Or do you think that the Scripture says in vain, "The Spirit who dwells in us yearns jealously?" James 4:5 (NKJV) (the spirit and the subject are the Holy Spirit)

Do you think the Scripture means nothing when it says, The spirit God caused to live in us has an envious yearning?" James 4:5 (NET) (The subject is God the spirit is the old man, the flesh, the sin nature)

In the Margin the (New Living Translation) NLT Offers These Translations:

"Do you think the Scriptures have no meaning? They say that God is passionate that the spirit he has placed within us should be faithful to him." James 4:5 (NLT) (God is the subject and the spirit is the spirit of the new man)

"They say that the spirit God has placed within us is filled with envy;" James 4:5 (NLT) (God is the subject the spirit is the old man, the flesh, the sin nature)

"They say that the Holy Spirit, whom God has placed within us, opposes our envy." James 4:5 NLT

- b) <u>Summary</u> and Readouts of Sub Points *a) i)* and *ii)* Concerning Some of the Difficulties in Interpreting James 4:4
 - The Human Spirit, i.e. the Old Man, The Flesh God Has Caused to Live in Us Is Exceedingly <u>Envious</u>
 - "Or do you think the Scripture means nothing when it says, The spirit God caused to live in us has an envious yearning?" James 4:5 (NET)
 - ii. God <u>Earnestly</u> Desires for the <u>Human</u> Spirit i.e. the <u>New Man He Has Caused to Dwell in Us</u>
 - "Or do you think Scripture says without reason that he jealously longs for the spirit he has caused to dwell in us?" James 4:5 (NIV 2011)
 - iii. The Holy Spirit God Has Caused to Live in Us Earnestly <u>Opposes</u> Our Envy
 - "They say that the Holy Spirit, whom God has placed within us, opposes our envy." James 4:5
 - iv. God <u>Earnestly</u> Desires for the <u>Holy</u> Spirit He Caused to Dwell in Us
 - "Or do you think that the Scripture speaks to no purpose: "He jealously desires the Spirit which He has made to dwell in us?" James 4:5 (NASB)
